


Annual Spaghetti Dinner, November 17th

Dear People of St. John's,

I have just finished reading an article by Dwight DeWerth-Pallmeyer that appeared in the Philadelphia Inquirer. It quotes statistics about the decline in church and synagogue attendance since 1972. It goes on to try to analyze why this decline has occurred. Pallmeyer cites "As of 2017, more than 27 percent of Americans labeled themselves as 'spiritual but not religious.'" Young people especially say they have been turned off by "hypocrisy of church leaders."

He cites loneliness as one loss that comes through not attending church and quotes some Cigna studies that lonely people are more likely to die prematurely than those who smoke. He says that "faith, at its core is about community." Another loss cited in the article is the loss of happiness. He cites The Journal Review of Religious Research as saying: "Numerous studies indicate a positive correlation between religiosity as measured by attendance at religious services and happiness."

In making suggestions on what churches might do, he says "One can only expect youth and adults to attend worship services if those gatherings resonate in a meaningful style that speaks to them in their language."

I tend to look a little deeper. Changing worship styles has drawn some people to church—at least for a time, as is evidenced by mega-churches. But the statistics tell us that the back door of those churches (the exit) is as busy as the front door. Perhaps the response of people who reject church attendance is a way God is forcing us to rethink what Church ought to be. I spoke of that a couple of weeks ago when I said that the church is merely a tool created by Jesus to help bring about the Kingdom of God.

My early faith formation was all about church. Attending and following the rules was supposed to guarantee the reward of heaven. But heaven and hell don't mean what they used to. People of our day have witnessed the hell of the holocaust, of nuclear weapons used on civilian populations, or unspeakable famine and the constant fear of terrorism. We have seen worse than any pictures of hell painted by churchmen. At the same time, in the oncedeeply Christian West, people are enjoying an abundance of goods that would have never be dreamed of by earlier generations. It is in the West, with a heaven-on-earth philosophy of consumerism that church attendance is declining.

So why go to church? For fellowship? Many churchgoers will cite the relationships they have at church as very meaningful to them. Common worship— what we do in community— is an expression of the values we hold as a group, and participation in worship strengthens us in those values. "Worship" comes from "worth-ship" suggesting it names what we find of worth. In the Episcopal style of worship, we often use language that is unlike everyday language, opening ourselves to the

consideration of things that are not part of everyday life-God, grace, eternity. We consider important themes for living like forgiveness and we are reminded of the model of Jesus as we read the words of scripture. These are the things that are important for human beings. We need a sense of our own worth beyond our capacity for buying things. We need a way of considering how we stand in this world in our relationships to something bigger than ourselves, and how we stand in relationship to other people and the created world. We need a model of morality beyond the embrace of "what's good for me". And we need the support of others who can tell us that, in spite of what we see on TV or in the other media, the values that we hold are sound and good and worth-while. We need each other to help us confirm that we are not crazy in embracing the vision that Jesus called the Kingdom of God. That's what happens when we take time from our busy schedules, or when we set aside our focus on our discomfort or inconvenience and we make a priority of joining together at church.

But that's not enough. That is only the formation that is required for becoming disciples. That is our classroom. The most important part of what we get out of church attendance is a sense of direction to make real the vision of God's kingdom. That doesn't happen in the church; it happens in the world. It begins in a small, but very important way with how we continue our personal relationships with God, other people and with creation.

Personal prayer is a mystery to most people. We have been told it is good, but rarely have we been taught how to do it. It has been presented to as a mysterious thing, and too often we have seen personal prayer as beyond us. In its simplest (and probably most effective) form, prayer is a conversation with God— both talking and listening.

Our relationship with others shows our conviction in Christ when we are loving. That is the death to self of considering what is best for others over what is best for ourselves. That extends to our care for the environment as well. As citizens of the world as well as citizens of the Kingdom of God, we ought to be convinced that what is best for the body politic is what we hold as dear in our religious convictions, and we exercise our civic duties, especially voting in a way that upholds the values of the Kingdom of God. This is not always clear, so we turn to conversation with others in church to help guide what we do outside the church. In those conversations we test and confirm our values.

So, we are not alone. We are part of an assembly that learns, tests, confirms and tries to live the values of our faith. This is a way of being guided by the Spirit, but it cannot be achieved without the participation of others.
